DEFINITIONS OF COMPLEMENTARY AND ALTERNATIVE MODALITIES

Veterinary Acupuncture and Acutherapy

Involve the examination and stimulation of specific points on the animal's body according to the principles of traditional Chinese medicine, for the purpose of diagnosis and treatment of numerous conditions. This stimulation is accomplished by the use of acupuncture needles, moxibustion, injections, low-level lasers, magnets, and a variety of other techniques.

Veterinary Botanical or Herbal Medicine

Is the therapeutic use of plants and plant derivatives, which are not classified as drugs, as a major component of case management.

Veterinary Chiropractic

Is the examination, diagnosis and treatment of animals through manipulation and adjustments of spinal and extremity joints and cranial sutures.

Veterinary Homeopathy

Is the treatment of disease using substances in minute doses. These substances, when used in large quantities, produce clinical disease symptoms in healthy animals, which are similar to those of the animal being treated (as per the principles of Samuel Hahnemann).

Veterinary Nutraceutical or Orthomolecular Medicine

Is the use of micronutrients, macronutrients and other nutritional supplements as a major component of case management.
